## 2012-2013 National LAOH Irish History Writing Contest Information

Introduction: Each year the Ladies Ancient Order of Hibernians, Inc. sponsors a National Irish History Writing Contest for students in Grades 6 through 12 in those states where the Ladies Ancient Order of Hibernians, Inc. have established Divisions. The contest is comprised of two levels: LEVEL 1 is for students in Grades 6, 7, or 8 and LEVEL 2 is for students in Grades 9, 10, 11, or 12. The theme for each contest level is specified each year.

<u>Eligibility</u>: Students who are enrolled in parochial, private, or public schools or who are home-schooled are eligible to participate in the Irish History Writing Contest. Each student entering the 2012-2013 National LAOH Irish History Writing Contest should be given a copy of the Student Information, Contest Rules, and Guidelines Sheet as well as a copy of the 2012-2013 National LAOH Irish History Writing Contest Judging Criteria.

#### 2012-2013 National LAOH Irish History Writing Contest Information:

- 1. Each student wishing to enter the Irish History Writing Contest is to follow the LAOH National Irish History Writing Contest information, rules, and guidelines established each year. This contest year, students are able to select to follow either the MLA Handbook for Writers of Research Papers Seventh Edition or the Publication Manual of the American Psychological association Sixth Edition as they complete their student papers. A writing style summary sheet is provided with the materials to be provided to interested students. Submitted student work will be judged at either LEVEL 1 (Grades 6, 7, 8) or at LEVEL 2 (Grades 9, 10, 11, 12) using the established LAOH National Irish History Writing Contest Information, Contest Rules, Guidelines, and Judging Criteria.
- 2. Student papers are first submitted to the LAOH Division Historian. Division winners are then forwarded to the County Board Historian in those states where County Boards exist. The County Board Historian then forwards County Board winners to the State Historian. If the state does not recognize the County Board structure, the Division Historian then forwards the Division winners directly to the State Historian. State Historians are to forward State winners to the National Historian.
- 3. All student papers must adhere to the specified LAOH National Irish History Writing Contest Information, Contest rules, and Guidelines in order to be forwarded to the next level. Although some schools and states may suggest or require students to use specific writing styles and frameworks, all students interested in participating in the LAOH National Irish History Writing Contest must use the published LAOH National Irish History Writing Contest Information, Contest Rules, Guidelines, and Judging Criteria.
- 4. Each Division, County Board if applicable, and State Board is to establish its own award levels for both LEVEL 1 and LEVEL 2 of the LAOH National Irish History Writing Contest. The Divisions, County Boards if applicable and State Boards are encouraged establish their own criteria to determine whether to award a first, second, and third place award for LEVEL 1 and LEVEL 2. It is optional at the Division, County Board if applicable, and State Board Level whether or not to establish a maximum of two (2) honorable mention awards.
- 5. The LAOH Irish Historian at each Level, utilizing a committee of qualified judges (persons with English and History backgrounds), will evaluate all LEVEL 1 and LEVEL 2 submitted student works using the LAOH National Irish History Writing Contest Information, Contest Rules, Guidelines, and Judging Criteria established each year and shall determine the winners at the specific level for the 2012-2013 LAOH National Irish History Writing Contest.

# 2012-2013 National LAOH Irish History Writing Contest Student Information, Contest Rules, and Guidelines:

Students are expected to follow either the MLA Handbook for Writers of Research Papers Seventh Edition or the Publication Manual of the American Psychological Association Sixth Edition as a guide as they prepare their paper. Once the student selects his/her writing style guide, he/she is to use only that writing style in completing his/her student paper. Contest rules for students are provided on a separate sheet titled 2012-2013 National LAOH Irish History Writing Contest Student Information, Contest Rules, and Guidelines Sheet. This information and the 2012-2013 National LAOH Irish History Writing Contest Student Writing Style Guideline Summary Sheet should be proved to each student interested in participating in the 2012-2013 National LAOH Irish History Writing Contest.

2012-2013 National LAOH Irish History Writing Contest Judging Criteria: Each paper is to be evaluated using the Judging Criteria established by the National Irish Historian. A separate Judging Criteria Sheet is provided with this information. The questions in each category on the Judging Criteria Sheet are suggested questions and are not limiting criteria for the judges, but rather they are provided to assist the judges with minimum criteria to use when evaluating each student paper. The judges should also review the 2012-2013 National LAOH Student Information, Contest Rules, and Guideline Sheet prior to evaluating each student paper.

The student's title page is to be removed and a number is to be given to the paper prior to the paper being given to the judges so that the judges are able to evaluate each paper without prejudice. Each paper will be evaluated in the following categories: (1) Comprehension with a point value of 1-30 points, (2) Organization with a point value of 1-20 points, (3) Conclusion with a point value of 1-15 points, (4) Creativity with a point value of 1-20 points, and (5) Writing with a point value of 1-15 points. A total of 100 points is available in the scoring procedure. At each level, the Irish Historian shall determine the recommended score to be achieved to move the student paper to the next level.

No markings should appear on the student work as it is being evaluated at each level. If a student paper is advanced to the next level with any markings, edits, scores, etc., it will be disqualified at the next level. A 2012-2013 National LAOH Irish History Writing Contest Judge's Summary Sheet is also provided to assist each judge in recording student scores.

Eligibility & Information: Students in grades 6 through 12 enrolled in parochial, private, or public schools or who are home-schooled are eligible to participate in the 2011-2012 National LAOH Irish History Writing Contest sponsored by the Ladies Ancient Order of Hibernians, Inc. The National LAOH Irish History Writing Contest is comprised of two levels: LEVEL 1 is for students in Grades 6, 7, or 8 and LEVEL 2 is for students in Grades 9, 10,

Each year a specific theme is specified for the Irish History Writing Contest LEVEL 1 and LEVEL 2. Each year specific information, rules, and guidelines are established for the National LAOH Irish History Writing Contest. The information, rules, and guidelines specified for this National LAOH Irish History Writing Contest may differ from those rules and guidelines that specific schools and/or states require for student writing contests.

All student papers submitted to participate in the 2012-2013 National LAOH Irish History Writing Contest must adhere to the specific information, rules, and guidelines provided by the National LAOH Irish History Writing

Paper Length:

LEVEL 1 - Not less than 500 words or more than 1,000 words

LEVEL 2 - Not less than 750 words or more than 1,500 words

Writing Style:

A student may choose to follow the MLA Handbook for Writers of Research Papers, Seventh Edition or the Publication Manual of the American Psychological Association Sixth Edition as he/she complete his/her student paper. Once the student selects his/her writing style, he/she is to only use that writing style to complete his/her student paper.

 Make sure to acknowledge all resources that you use as you prepare your paper. According to the MLA Handbook for Writers of Research Papers, Seventh Edition:

Plagiarism involves two kinds of wrongs. Using another person's ideas, information, or expressions without acknowledging that person's work constitutes intellectual theft. Passing off another person's ideas, information, or expressions as your own to get a better grade or gain some advantage constitutes

## Writing Style Requirements to be used for the National LAOH Irish History Writing Contest:

- Paper is to use double line spacing throughout the paper including the (1) title page, (2) body of paper, (3) quotations, and (4) sources used page (MLA -- Works Cited or APA - References)
- Paper is to be completed using a word processor preferably, but a legibly hand-written papers is acceptable
- Paper is to be printed or hand-written on white paper, single-sided only

- Letter font is not to exceed 12 point if using a word processing software program or double line spaced if paper is hand-written
- Margins are to be one (1) inch at the (1) top of page, (2) bottom of page, (3) left side of page, and (4) right
- Paragraphs are to be indented one-half (½) inch from left margin, the indented line alerts the reader to a new paragraph as you use double lines spacing throughout the paper
- MLA Style—Quotations that run less than four (4) lines are incorporated in the body of the paragraph
- MLA Style—Quotations are to be indented one (1) inch from left margin if the quotation runs more than four
- APA Style—Quotations less than 40 words are incorporated in the body of the paragraph
- APA Style—Quotations are to be indented one (1) inch from the left margin if the quotation runs 41+ words
- References are to be acknowledged in the body of the text using either the MLA Style or the APA Style
- Sources used are to be listed on a separate page after the body of the paper. The MLA Style uses the title Works Cited for the page. The APA Style uses the title References for the page. In both writing styles, the author's name is flush with the left margin and the second double line spacing is indented one-half (½) inch
- The Works Cited (MLA) or the References (APA) page should be numbered as the next page following the last page of the body of the paper. All entries should be in alphabetical order.
- The term "Bibliography" is not acceptable for the sources used page

## Additional Style Requirements to be used for the National LAOH Irish History Writing Contest:

- Title Page is to be provided using double line spacing and must provide the student's name, address, city, state, zip code, phone number, school name, grade level, and number of words in paper exclusive of the Works Cited/References section
- The Title Page should not be numbered
- Page numbers are to be placed in the upper right hand corner at one-half (½) inch from the top margin at the right margin; the student's name should not appear in front of the page number
- Page numbers should be consecutive beginning with the first page of the body of the paper through the Works Cited/References section of the paper
- Running Heads are not to be used
- Drawings, maps, charts, pictures, etc. are not to be included in the title page or the body of the paper
- Wikipedia is not to be used as a reference in this writing contest

#### 2012-2032 National LAOH Irish History Writing Contest Judging Criteria:

- Each paper will be evaluated in these categories with a maximum number of points allocated for each category: (1) Comprehension [30 points], (2) Organization [20 points], (3) Conclusion [15 points], (4) Creativity [20 points], and (5) Writing [15 points]
- Please refer to the Judging Criteria Sheet for assistance in learning how the judges will evaluate the student paper. The suggested questions are not limiting criteria for the judges, but rather they are provided to assist the judges with minimum criteria to use when evaluating the student paper
- The student's title page will be removed and the paper will be given a number prior to be given to the judges, so the judges are able to evaluate each paper without prejudice
- All papers submitted to the judges to be evaluated are to be without any markings
- Student papers will be disqualified if there are any markings on the paper as it is evaluated
- The Irish Historian at each level will determine the minimum score to be achieved for the student paper to be forwarded to the next level within the Ladies Ancient Order of Hibernians, Inc. for further consideration in the 2012-2013 National LAOH Irish History Writing Contest
